قُلْ إِنَّ صَلَاتِي وَنُسُكِي وَمَحْيَايَ وَمَمَاتِي لِلَّهِ رَبِّ الْعَالَمِينَ ﴿١٦٢﴾

"Say: Indeed, my prayer, my sacrifice, my living, and my dying are for Allah, the Lord of all worlds." (Surah Al-An'am 6:162 - Quran

This verse is more than words. It is a complete way of life. It is a statement that, if taken to heart, will transform everything about us, our perspective, our goals, our struggles, and our sense of fulfillment. It is the anthem of those who have found their true purpose. It is the heartbeat of those who have surrendered everything to the Divine.

1. The Declaration of Ultimate Purpose

Imagine standing in prayer with full conviction that this moment is the most important part of your day. Imagine knowing that in this very instant, the King of the heavens and the earth is

Prophet Muhammad (May peace and Allah's blessings be upon him) said, *"The first thing a person will be questioned about on the Day of Judgment is his prayer. If it is in order, then the rest of his deeds will be in order, and if it is lacking, then the rest of his deeds will be lacking."* (Tirmidhi)

Prophet Muhammad (May peace and Allah's blessings be upon him), would sometimes weep in prayer, his beard soaked in tears, showing the depth of his connection to his Lord. He once said, *"The closest that a servant is to his Lord is while he is in prostration, so increase in supplication."* (Sahih Muslim)

3. My Sacrifice (Nusuki) is for Allah, Devotion beyond Comfort

The word نُسُكِي (**nusuki**) refers to acts of devotion, particularly sacrifice. It is a reminder that love is not just about words, it is about what we are willing to give up for the One we love.

Every great love story in history involves sacrifice. Parents sacrifice for their children. Soldiers sacrifice for their nations. But the greatest sacrifice is the one made for Allah. This is the sacrifice that is never wasted, never regretted, never forgotten.

When we declare, **"My sacrifice is for Allah,"** we affirm that nothing in this world is too precious to withhold from Him. We

are ready to give up our ego, our desires, our comforts, and even our very lives if it means earning His pleasure.

The story of Prophet Ibrahim (alayhis salam), peace be upon him, who was willing to sacrifice his beloved son is a timeless lesson in surrendering to Allah. Likewise, the story of the Ansar of Madinah, who welcomed the Muhajirun with open arms, offering them half of their wealth, is another remarkable example of selfless sacrifice in the path of Allah.

4. My Life (Mahyaya) is for Allah, Living with Divine Purpose

How many people are truly alive? Not just breathing, but alive in the fullest sense, hearts illuminated, souls driven by meaning, days filled with purpose.

When we say, "**My life is for Allah,**" we are choosing to live every second with intention. We are deciding that our careers, our relationships, our ambitions, everything will be aligned with pleasing Him.

This means that every act, eating, sleeping, working, speaking, even laughing, can be worship if done with the right intention. When we dedicate our existence to Allah, we no longer divide life into religious and worldly. Our entire life becomes worship.

Prophet Muhammad (May peace and Allah's blessings be upon him), smiled, laughed, played with children, conducted business, and led armies. All of it was for Allah. His life was proof that devotion is not just in ritual, it is in every moment lived with sincerity.

A companion once asked the Prophet, *"O Messenger of Allah, even when we eat, will we be rewarded if we do it for Allah?"* He replied, *"Yes, if you eat with the intention of gaining strength to worship Allah."* (Bukhari)

5. My Death (Mamati) is for Allah, A Return to the Beloved

Death is the most terrifying thought for many. But for the one who has lived for Allah, death is nothing but a doorway to reunion. It is not an end, it is a homecoming.

When we declare, **"My death is for Allah,"** we are affirming that **we do not fear the end because we know it is not the end.** We live knowing that every moment takes us closer to meeting Him. And when that moment comes, we want to return having fulfilled our purpose.

Prophet Muhammad (May peace and Allah's blessings be upon him) described death as the gift of the believer. Why? because it is the moment when the struggles of this world end, and the reward begins.

Imagine closing your eyes in this world and opening them in a realm of eternal beauty, seeing angels welcoming you, and hearing the Lord of all worlds saying, Well done, My servant.

Conclusion: A Legacy of Devotion

Life is short, and the choices we make today will echo in eternity. To truly live for Allah means aligning our every action, thought, and aspiration with His pleasure. It means praying as

though we see Him, sacrificing what we love for His sake, and living each day as a step closer to meeting Him.
